- In our study of Philippians this morning, *Paul* tells the *Philippians* to rejoice. Now there's an oxymoron if ever I saw one! On a personal level, Paul was in prison. Culturally, being a Christ-follower in the 1st century was treacherous for the Philippians. Yet *he* tells *them* to rejoice!
- We're not too unlike Paul or the Philippians. For many, life stinks right now! And yet the Bible says **REJOICE IN THE LORD.** How can we do that?

I read that in the Bible. I "get it" in my head. But what does that really mean to me? How does "God is Sovereign" bring JOY and help me rejoice when life isn't going so well?
Here's what it means to me. And here's why I have joy.
Nothing is for God. Behold, I am the LORD, the God of all flesh. Is anything too hard for me? (Jeremiah 32:27)
Nothing is for God. O LORD, you have searched me and known me! You know when I sit down and when I rise up; (Psalm 139:1-2)
2. God is Let your reasonableness be known to everyone. The Lord is at hand (Philippians 4:5, emphasis added).
3. God Gives And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus (v. 7).
